The Call to a National Day of Prayer, is in response to the Covid -19 pandemic, people of faith across our nation are invited to join in prayerful solidarity with this witness. Light a candle at 7pm each Sunday, in the window of our homes as a visible symbol of the light of life, Jesus Christ, the source of hope in this life.

Faith in action – HIV/AIDS

1st December is International AIDS Day. In the SEC prayer cycle for December we pray for unconditional acceptance of people living with HIV/AIDS as equal members of the body of Christ. The HIV pandemic affects every part of our world, including Scotland. Thanks to the development of effective treatment, many people are now living with HIV rather than dying from AIDS. Recent years have seen an increase in new HIV infections in Scotland - the majority within the heterosexual population. People living with HIV face stigma and discrimination on a regular basis.

We remember the millions of people throughout our world who are living with HIV. People in the developed world who have access to life saving treatments, but who often struggle to manage the regimes. People in the developing world with little or no access to treatment, families who have lost an entire generation; orphaned children who struggle to bring up their siblings. We pray for all those who are committed to changing this situation God of love and compassion, hear the prayers of your people.
